
Dementia Care in the Community

With proactive care and the right support, they can live safely and independently at home, easing demands on caregivers and emergency services.






The number of people living with dementia in the community

## increased by 46%

between 2009/10 and 2015/16, and is projected to rise by a further 16% between 2015/16 and 2020/21.1



Nearly half of long-stay home care patients living with dementia have caregivers who are distressed.

Among long-stay home care patients who exhibit behavioural symptoms of dementia, more than 60% have caregivers who are distressed.2
